Thoughts from Pastor Jim



Road Signs and Milestones—Mark Your Calendar!

Every summer growing up my family drove to Mississippi to visit family. I always looked forward to spending time with my cousins, but I didn't look forward to the long drive. My dad was never in a hurry to get there and we, frustratingly, would stop for a full sit-down breakfast along the way and then another long sit-down lunch. There were many breaks at rest areas and usually we would also take a side trip to see some "attraction" or state park that Dad had not seen.

To make the trip more bearable, I broke the trip down into smaller, more attainable chunks. Instead of thinking "ugh, we still have 600 miles to go," I would look forward to the next exit. I knew every town named on the exit signs between our home and my grandparents' house 750 miles away. As we passed each exit, I would name the next one and how many minutes until we reach it.

The journey toward merger that our congregations have been on for more than two years has seemed a lot like that long drive to Mississippi. "Will we ever get there?!" and "not another detour!" are apt complaints for both journeys, and we are tired. But now, we are almost there--phew! It has been a long and, at times, difficult journey, but there are only a few more road signs left to pass before we reach the journey's end.

This month, the merger proposal will be mailed or distributed by hand to every professing member of each church for your prayerful review and study. The Merger Exploration Team—consisting of Pastors Jim and Pete, Niki Avina, Bob Brown, Nancy Craig, Jane Harper-Alport, Cyndi Slaboski, Fran Vukovich, and Mary Zaikis—will be happy to answer any questions you have about the details of the proposal.

On June 29, following worship, each church will hold its own church conference to vote on the proposal led by our Associate District Superintendent, Rev. Paul Arnold. At the conferences, professing members will receive a ballot. There may be a time to ask clarifying questions, but there will be no debate on the question. The vote will be a simple yes or no to accept the proposal.

If the proposal passes both church conferences, the proposal will then be sent to the Bishop and Cabinet of the Indiana Conference of the United Methodist Church for their approval. The Cabinet meeting to approve the merger proposal will take place in August. If the Cabinet approves the merger, we will officially become Hope United Methodist Church on August 28. There will also be some additional legal work to be completed during this time.

Further, following a yes vote from both congregations, on July 6 we will immediately move to worshiping only at the Northcote location except for the last Sunday in August. On August 31 we will hold a final service at the Hohman Ave. location where we will celebrate the history and ministry of First United Methodist Church of Hammond and de-consecrate the building. Likewise, on August 24, we will hold a final service in the Northcote building that celebrates the history and ministry of Woodmar United Methodist Church. On September 7, we will gather as one consolidated congregation in the Northcote building for an opening celebration of Hope United Methodist Church. Finally, in late October or early November, we will have a Service of Dedication for the newly united congregation with a more robust celebration and fellowship meal.

The end of this journey is near. The last few miles over the coming weeks are a time for tears of sorrow and tears of joy. There is sadness at the very real loss that both congregations are experiencing, and it is important that we make space for that grief and embrace it. At the same time, assuming we choose to merge to become a new church, there is much cause for joy and celebration. This is an opportunity to reverse the decline our churches have been experiencing and an opportunity to live into the future God is calling us to journey toward. I am convinced that this is not happening because of declining finances and attendance, but because God has a new thing in store for us. God is faithful, God is loving, and God has a plan for us! In the midst of our change, Christ is our solid rock. Look for the road signs pointing the way forward and enjoy the journey.

Below is a short description of the movie.

"PUSHOUT: THE CRIMINALIZATION OF BLACK GIRLS IN SCHOOLS" is a feature length documentary that takes a close look at the educational, judicial and societal disparities facing African American girls. The documentary is based on Dr. Monique W. Morris' groundbreaking book of the same name and confronts the ways in which the misunderstanding of Black girlhood has led to excessive punitive discipline which in turn disrupts one of the most important factors in their lives: education.





Finance and Administrative



Woodmar UMC Finance News

April ended with expenses over income of \$7,179. The offerings for the month were only \$5,700, which is down substantially from previous months. Our cash in the bank at the end of April was \$32,916. Expenses were up a little due to having 3 payroll periods in April. Our year-to-date bottom line is a positive \$2,665.

Community Preschool ended April with expenses over income of \$14,071. This was also due to having 3 pay periods for the month and a lag in reimbursement for Child Care Development Fund assistance. They have \$73,970 cash in bank and their year-to-date (August 2025 through April 2025) bottom line is a negative \$40,186. Their fiscal year will end in July.

First Church Finance News

April Finances vs May Finances

The church had monthly income of \$13,026.44 and monthly expenses of \$28,135.57, resulting in a net loss of \$10,601.13. Our May income was \$9.870.11 in offerings and e-giving and total income of \$11,418.11 with total monthly expenses of \$16,002.13, resulting in a net loss of \$4,584.02. Our checking account had a balance of over \$361,092.51. This money is made up of funds from the sale of the parsonage as well as other funds that are restricted to their use. However due to our financial situation, we continue to use restricted funds to pay our monthly obligations including salaries, utilities, insurance, pensions, etc.

The Finance committee continues to work with Heartland United Methodist Foundation, formerly the United Methodist Foundation of Indiana, to develop a plan on how to be the best stewards of the money we presently have in our checking account. At the present time, the amount of money in our checking account exceeds the maximum amount insured by FDIC. Our goal is to maintain enough money in the checking account to meet our financial obligations over the next several months and invest the rest in a short term investment portfolio in order to earn some interest.

I will continue to meet with our Treasurer, Larry Alport, and Pastor Denton to monitor our finances and will keep the congregation informed as how we are addressing our financial shortfall.

We will also begin the process of evaluating where Hope United Methodist Church will bank, a new financial policy manual, and a credit card policy.
